My Dear Friends;

So much of the time we think it cannot happen to us. And of course that provides us with a built-in optimism that makes each day not quite the burden it might otherwise be. We drive our cars, perhaps not excessively fast but still faster and without the constant nervous expectation of someone coming round the next (and every) bend on the wrong side of the road! The opposite side of the coin is the view that only other people have "good luck". As with all attitudes, excess can be damaging to our wellbeing. Over anxious about every harmful possibility makes us paranoid; thinking that only other people have good things might turn us to be jealous.

When the Church talks about "healing", it is not using the word "cure". Healing is about wholeness -the good balance in our life of our physical wellbeing, our mental stability and our spiritual peace. The medical profession now accepts the importance of this holistic approach and has found that physical healing is helped when there is mental and spiritual health.

In a world of change, which is another way of saying a world of life, the Christian view is that it is also a world for Love. God's love is not constant but changes for us and with us; but God's love is steadfast (always there). Within the changes there are things that harm us and threaten us, as well as those that please us and uplift us. In both areas I believe we need to involve God so that out of what seems harmful or may be very hurtful there may come good and peace; and within the excitement of things that go well we offer our own vulnerability. (Just think of the problems that sudden power, or wealth or popularity have brought to those who thought that all was suddenly wonderful!)

This "wholeness" is what Christ offers us as life in all its fullness. It may not be a life that fulfils all our ambitions, for they may not be for our good; but it is a life that fulfils us in being human. What a wonderful gift -it is for you just as it is for those "lucky other people"! Why not accept it?

NEWS FROM THE PAST

In 1987, the Elmsted and Hastingleigh Parish Magazine was produced as a Souvenir Issue for the Sankey Day Celebrations. John Sankey of Kingsmill Down first signed the register as churchwarden in 1717. Later the family moved to "South Hill" where they farmed for over 200 years. The family tree has been traced back to 1089. Many Sankeys are buried at Hastingleigh, either in the church or the churchyard. The church and the village owe much to the many benefactors of the family.

And so, in July 1987, various celebrations took place and about sixty members of the Sankey Family were welcomed to the church service and celebrations. Today we are always pleased to welcome Mr Martin Sankey to our services when he visits Hastingleigh from his home near Sevenoaks.

The centre pages of the Souvenir Issue were reproduced from the original magazines of 1897 and 1899 and I thought that some of our "newer" readers might be interested to read the articles written a hundred years ago about our villages. The magazine cost one penny!

April 1897

BAPTISM.

Feb. 26-Herbert Thomas Hayward, at Hastingleigh.

The Confirmation, at which Candidates from this parish will be presented, will be held at Wye Church on Saturday, April 22nd, at 3 o'clock. The parents of candidates, and any others who would like to be present, are cordially invited to attend the Service.

The Annual Assembly of the Elmsted Meeting was held in the Schoolroom on Monday, March 13th, Mr. Wetherell being in the chair. The business to transact consisted of choosing Parish Councillors for the coming year. All those who served last year were re-elected excepting Mr-Timins, whose place is taken by Mr. Pettit. The latter having resigned his office of District Councillor and Guardian of the Parish, Mr. Timins has been appointed in his place. Mr. Pettit has filled the office during the last three years to the satisfaction of all, and our best thanks are due to him for the time and trouble he has devoted to guarding the interests of the Parish

The Hastingleigh Parish Meeting was held in the Mission Room on Thursday, March 23rd, the Rector being in the chair; Mr. Robert Marsh and Mr. Benjamin Reeves were re-elected. Overseera, and Mr. W. Cobb paid Assistant Overseer.

There was a meeting of the Evington Cricket Club at the Institute on Tuesday evening. March 21st. Only a very few members were present. After the accounts of the past year had been looked into, the question of matches for the ensuing season was discussed. Altogether nine matches were arranged for, the clubs it is proposed to play being Wye, Elham, Sandling Park, Street End, and Chartham Asylum. A point discussed, without any conclusion being arrived at, was that of keeping the ground in playing condition: but this will, we hope, be definitely arranged for before the cricket season commences. The officers of the Club remain the same as last season.

The Diamond Jubilee has been filling the thoughts of all Englishmen for weeks past, and has been the one topic of conversation. Half the populace have written letters to the newspapers on the subject, and the other half have filled the advertisement columns with it. But now the great day has come and gone, and those who had the privilege of seeing the wonderful procession, the lavish decorations, and the brilliant illuminations in London on June 22nd, will not soon forget the sight.

But here at home in Elmsted and Hastingleigh no one can accuse us of disloyalty. On Sunday, June 20th, special Thanksgiving Services were held in both Churches, when "God save the Queen." and the Jubilee Hymn, written by the Bishop of Wakefield, were well rendered by the choir and congregation, the sermons being preached by the Rector and the Rev. A. W. Rawlins. On Thursday, June 24th, the fete in honour of the sixtieth year of the reign of Queen Victoria, for which we have for a long time been making preparations, was held in Evington Park. A better day could not have been chosen, the sun shone brightly, the air was warm (rather too warm for those who had to work hard), and the park was looking its best. The tents, which had been kindly lent for the occasion by Mr. Charles Hardy, of Chilham Castle, had been put up the night before, and all the morning they were filled with the energetic ladies of the Tea Committee, cutting up cake and bread and butter, and the most enticing sandwiches. We were not at all surprised to hear afterwards from many how much they had enjoyed their tea. The tables held one hundred persons at a time, and the expedition with which they were cleared and made ready for each fresh detachment was worthy of all praise. A Jubilee mug was given to each of the children, and as they are not of a fragile nature we hope that many may survive, and be handed down to future generations as souvenirs of the Diamond Jubilee of our good Queen. The great success of the Festival was undoubedly due to the unanimous co-operation of all concerned. Not only has money been subscribed, but many have given most liberally in kind as well, so that the expenses will amount to about half of what they would otherwise have been.

The Sports were well carried out by the Sports Committee, and were very successful. Indeed, there were many eager aspirants for athletic fame, not only among the young, but among those advanced in years; and members of the fair sex also might be seen careering over the green turf in truly graceful style. The tug-of-war between Elmsted and Hastingleigh resulted in a victory for the latter. As to the Baby show, the result has not yet reached us, and so the name of the youthful prizewinner cannot be recorded. It must have been a trying task for the judges to decide the winning baby.

As evening advanced, dancing was indulged in to the merry music of the Band of the 1st V. B. East Kent Regiment, which had been playing excellently during the afternoon, to the delight of all who are fond of good music.

As darkness drew on, there was a brilliant display of fireworks. The coloured fires amid the trees had a very beautiful effect, and the Roman candles and rockets were very fine, and, as the right was dark showed to great advantage. It was nearly 11 o'clock when the proceedings closed. The band played the National Anthem, in which all joined with hearty voice; and thus ended a day which everyone thoroughly enjoyed, and will long remember.

On Wednesday, June 16th, the match between Evington and Wye took place on the Evingtod ground. At the close Wye had the advantage of us by five runs, but it might not have been so has not Mr. Pearson, who had scored 44 runs, been obliged to retire from the game before!the end of his innings. However, it was a very good match, and was a very even contest. The scores were, Wye 200, Evington 95.

HARVEST FESTIVAL

The Harvest Festival Services will be held in Elmsted Church on Sunday, October 10th, and in Hastingleigh Church on Sunday, October 17th, at 10.30 and 6.30. The preacher at the evening service on October 10th will be the Rev. A. A. Newport, of Boughton-under-Blean. All gifts of fruit, corn, vegetables, or flowers will be most gladly received, and may be sent to the Churches on the preceding Saturday. The offertories will be given, as usual, to the County Hospital.

The collections made on Sunday, Sept. 19th, on behalf of the Day Schools, amounted to the sum of £2 7s. 6d.; this is an advance, we are glad to say, of fourteen shillings on last year's collection. The Treasurer will be very grateful to receive any promises of subscriptions, however small, towards the funds. Messrs. Cadbury and Messrs. Coats, at the request of Mr. C. Tappenden, have kindly sent us cases, illustrating the preparation of their respective manufactures, to be placed in the school. We have no doubt they will prove both ornamental to the school, and instructive to the scholars.

The final meeting of the Elmsted and Hastingleigh Diamond Jubilee Committee was held on August 30th, when the Treasurer presented his balance-sheet, showing a halance in band, after all expenses had been paid, of £1 123, 2½d. This it was finally decided should be expended on new books for the lending library, as it was thought this would be to a great extent a permanent memorial in which all could participate. Mr. P. Barlings suggested that a tree should be planted near the pond at Hastingleigh as a memorial of the year, and we are glad to be able to say that Mr. R. Sankey has kindly promised to present a tree for this purpose, and if it should be desired a second one to be planted in Elmsted Parish.

Many parishes have now what is commonly called a "Mothers' Meeting"; and the large number of mothers who become members wherever these meetings are held seems to prove that they are greatly appreciated and do much useful work. Mrs. Timins thinks we might do the same here, and proposes to hold such meetings during the winter months; further particulars of which will be made known shortly.

On Monday, August 23rd, there was a very pretty wedding celebrated in Elmsted Church, when Miss E. B. Wetherell, of this parish, was united to Mr. J. W. T. Ashby.

The Vicar officiated, and the Church was full of numerous friends and relatives. The bride, who was arrayed in white, and attended by six bridesmaids, was given away by her father, the highly esteemed master of the schools. The brother of the bride presided at the organ, the hymns, "The voice that breathed o'er Eden," and "Thine for ever," being beautifully rendered during the service. After the service a merry peal was rung upon the bells, under the superintendence of Mr. Hooker; and the happy pair drove away amid many manifestations of rejoicing and good will.

The wedding party were entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Wetherell, and the presents, which were

both numerous and costly, were displayed at the school.

Mr. and Mrs. Ashby have gone to their new home, Little Kingshill, Missenden, Bucks, where they have a School. They have our most sincere good wishes for their success and happiness in their new sphere of duty.




members were pleased to hear that the results of the votes were as they had wished.
