



GREETINGS FROM ABU DHABI

As some of you may know, we moved out to Abu Dhabi in the United Arab Emirates at the end of September. We came out here to manage a Training Institute whilst at the same time continuing to run our own Education and Training Consultancy company in the UK.

We are no strangers to this part of the world, having been regular visitors for the past eight years. However, working here is a bit different from being a visitor. Abu Dhabi is a very modern city – 25 years ago it was just desert! We are not city folk and so living in a high rise apartment has taken some adjustment. We moved into our own place six weeks ago. It was good fun to go about finding a place and then furnishing it – just like being married all over again.

There are lots of things here to remind us of home. Abu Dhabi has a "Next", a "BHS" and a "Marks and Sparks". We have a large Coop which opens from 8.00 am to midnight and a "Spinneys" which sells Tesco brands – its nice to open the familiar tin of baked beans occasionally! We travel to Dubai and Sharjah once per week. Dubai is fantastic for shopping.

The working hours take a bit of getting used to. We do a morning shift from 9 to 1 and an evening shift from 5 to 9, six days a week. Our day off is Friday and we really enjoy it! As Abu Dhabi is an island connected to the mainland by two short bridges, the waters of the Arabian Gulf surround us. The sea is a beautiful blue during the day turning to green as dusk approaches. The sunsets are magnificent.

Now that winter is upon us, the temperature has fallen to a chilling 34 degrees C (which as Ron Lobeck would have said is only 93 degrees F). Most of our staff have colds and are complaining of the cold weather!

We keep in touch with Village matters through Tracey and Garry who send us emails almost every day. Recently, we received a copy of the November issue of the Community News, which prompted this article. We miss you all a lot and often think about Hastingleigh and Elmsted. We'll be back for Christmas and hope to catch up with some of you then.

Our best wishes for Christmas and the New Year to you all.



Next year's programme was presented and approved.


The recent Line Dancing made a good profit which will help to balance the coming year's budget. Special thanks to Sandra Argar for all the support she brought along.

CUBA CYCLE RIDE

Thanks to the generosity of friends and neighbours. I was able to raise over £2000 by taking part in the Cycle Cuba charity bike ride in aid of the National Deaf Childrens Society at the beginning of October. I have just returned from a gruelling 265 mile 5 day trip which took us from Havana on the north west coast across the Escombray mountains to the colonial town of Trinidad on the island's southern shores. The journey took in sugar plantations, small towns and villages, forested hills and a lot of pot holes, lush vegetation and palm trees and the occasional tropical downpour - affording welcome relief from temperatures in the high 30s. The scenery was spectacularly beautiful and I felt very privileged to be able to explore the island and meet the people on a bike - particularly as with a shortage of fuel and modern means of transport the Cubans themselves rely heavily on bicycles to get about.

We were joined on our trip by two deaf cyclists who were a constant reminder of our aim. In fact this sense of purpose and the support and help generated by 90 committed cyclists of all ages and abilities were as overwhelming as the landscape and the welcome of the Cuban people. The response to these Challenge Cuba rides (I took part in the first of three such events) has been so enthusiastic that the NDCS has donated £20,000 to deaf children in Cuba. In a country where the average wage is equivalent to £7 per month this lump sum will purchase a number of hearing aids and other much needed equipment.

And now I am home you might be wondering whether I will still be seen struggling up the hill to Hastingleigh. Certainly at the end of our longest day's cycle (75 miles from Colon to Cienfuegos) I swore I would never attempt anything like it again. However, I gather there is a trip planned to Iceland next summer......





HYMN WRITER OF THE MONTH

Charles Wesley b. Bristol 18 December 1707 d. 1788

HYMN 31 Come, thou long expected Jesus, born to set thy people free; from our fears and sins release us, let us find thy rest in thee.

It is impossible to read the history of England in the 18th century without encountering John and Charles Wesley. They became key figures in the religious revival which made a huge impact on the country. John, four years senior to his brother, became the leader of the Methodist Movement, with Charles as the equally doughty champion of the cause. They were sons of the rectory, and after academic studies at Oxford became priests. At Oxford they had, with a group of others, become heavily influenced by the writings of William Law and became devout members of the Holy Club where the group were nicknamed methodists. Subsequent to their time at Oxford both men independently of each other underwent a spiritual experience within three days of each other. This gave them the zeal to join in the evangelisation of England regarding the country as their parish. Their journals recording encounters and descriptions make fascinating reading. "I rode to Ashford", wrote John in his entry for 4 December 1771, "one of the pleasantest towns in Kent". What can happen in 200 years!

Of the two, Charles became the family man, founding a musical dynasty: his grandson S.S Wesley was an eminent organist and still well loved composer. Although John wrote some fine hymns, largely German translations, it was Charles who was outstanding in both quality and quantity, writing no less than 6,500 hymns. His brother saw the hymn as a valuable aid for teaching and promoting spiritual growth. Charles supplied! It was a solid working partnership. Some of Charles Wesley's best loved hymns are: "Hark! the herald angels sing", "Love divine, all loves excelling" and "Rejoice, the Lord is King".

"Come thou long expected Jesus" appeared in his volume "Hymns for the Nativity of our Lord", published in 1744. Although this hymn is used for Advent, its original intention was to celebrate Christmas. However, the opening line, and reference to the coming kingdom in verse three give it an Advent appeal. Stainer's tune "Cross of Jesus" suits the mood of the words well.
