



EVINGTON GARDENERS

The gardens of Flanders was the subject of an interesting and illuminating talk given by Melanie Gibson-Barton at the November meeting. What this reviewer had not appreciated was the enthusiasm for plants and gardening in Flanders coupled with a very formal style of gardening, very different from the more free and naturalistic planting in English gardens and a style not entirely to the taste of some in the audience. Ms. Gibson-Barton showed pictures of front gardens, most very formal in design involving straight lines, textures and blocks of colour with espalier planting together with a lot of Box, all clipped very neatly. There were pictures of block planting on a municipal scale too in the parks of Bruges and in Brussels. Nurseries stock an excellent array of plants and also have their own gardens. Many plants are grown for export as well. There were pictures too of the botanical gardens at Meise, near Brussels, with some lovely Victoria Amazonica water lilies from Brazil like huge tea trays, the arboretum at Het Leen, the botanical gardens in Antwerp and at Ghent University and the largest Japanese garden in Europe in Hasselt. It was a good talk and encouraged members of the audience to look at Flanders with a fresh eye.

Members also enjoyed a Christmas party in December with music provided by the Studio Players. They played pieces by Barthomieu, Donjon and Bizet. Our thanks go very much to them and to Trevor Wye for organising the evening. The talk on 18 February is entitled, 'Less pain, more gain', and will be given by Malcolm Withnall. 

HASTINGLEIGH WITH ELMSTED WI

Hastingleigh with Elmsted W.I. met on Thursday 2nd January at Evington Hall.

Eleven members attended and we paid our annual subscription. The business was dealt with and then our President, Mrs. Argar, introduced the speaker, Dr. Geoff Turner, who spoke about Van 132 - Soldier, Sailor, Spy.

Van 132 was a railway luggage van that carried the bodies of the Unknown Warrior (Soldier), Captain Charles Fryatt (Sailor) and Edith Cavell (alleged Spy) from Europe to England via Dover after the First World War. The stories of the three people carried in the van were very interesting. The Unknown Warrior was chosen from one of four bodies of men who had died in battle. Their bodies were covered in Union Jacks - one body was chosen and the other three were buried nearby. Captain Charles Fryatt was in the Merchant Navy and attempted to sink a German U-Boat in 1915. Fifteen months later his ship was captured by the Germans. He was court martialled and later executed. Edith Cavell nursed wounded British servicemen and helped about 200 to escape. She was betrayed, tried and executed in 1915. In 1919 her body was exhumed and about 100,000 watched her funeral procession (including van 132) come through Dover. The van was stored at Robertsbridge and then transferred to the Kent and East Sussex Railway who launched a £35,000 appeal to restore it. It is now to be found at Bodiam station.

Next month we will be having an open meeting. Our guest speaker will be Mrs Amanda Cottrell whose talk is entitled 'Kent on a plate (Olympics thrown in)'. Mrs Cottrell has given us several talks in the past and they are always enjoyable and entertaining. The meeting will be at 8 p.m. in Evington Hall, price £2. All are welcome, and we look forward to seeing you there.

FLU OVER THE URINE SAMPLE

Themes of the month. First Flu, we have not yet seen any flu but it comes every year to one degree or another. I am concerned that quite a number of high risk patients are not yet protected. Some have had immunisations at Tesco or another provider, if you have could you possibly let us know so we do not keep bothering you? For those that have not had the immunization, it is really important. Many tell me 'I have never had flu, so I cannot see the point' or 'it gives me a cold'. As regards the first, you might say the same about being run down by a bus, but it is no less damaging when you do. In the case of flu, the fact you have not had it markedly increases your risk. 10% of over 65's die of flu if they contract it. If there are two of you, how will you cope when both of you contract it?

Every year we are faced with couples, both bed bound and very sick, perhaps one hospitalized because they chose not to have the jab. In the modern parlance hash tag justsayin!

Now the urine sample. We struggle to get urine samples tested for micro albumin each year in those with high blood pressure and diabetes. What's a bit of protein between friends and why do we make you pee? Well, it turns out that it's quite important. Micro albumin, or more accurately the ratio of protein to creatinine in the urine is a very early marker for kidney disease which can lead on to kidney failure. If we catch it early with these tests, we can take measures to avoid or delay such disease. But we do need the wee back in order to assess your risk so please let us take the

Anyway, happy new year, try and follow NICE guidance regarding exercise this year, at least three sessions of 30 minutes of activity a week, plenty of fruit and vegetables, keep alcohol to sensible levels and come and see us about stopping smoking. It really does make a difference to your health but equally importantly, to your feeling of wellbeing. Anxiety and depression undoubtedly improve with regular exercise, it is impossible not to feel uplifted by a walk around the beautiful countryside that surrounds us. I might do a piece about diet soon, I have read some interesting facts about fats that dispel some of our previously held beliefs. What is undoubtedly true though is that processed foods, no olive oil, vegetable oils and anything containing transfats are to be avoided as they have a very significant impact on your risk of heart disease.

ST. MARY'S CHURCH, HASTINGLEIGH

Many people who come to visit St Mary's Church in Hastingleigh often query why the church was built so far from the major part of the village. Only a few houses, such as Court Lodge, its cottages and converted farm buildings, lie in the neighbourhood of the church itself. Moreover other villages in Kent and elsewhere have the same feature. For instance Challock church lies at an even greater distance than does Hastingleigh's church from its village. Then there are the Romney Marsh churches, with some, like Fairfield, having no village at all nearby.

The usual explanation for all this is that at the time of the Black Death, there arose a fear of contracting the plague from the churchyard, where burials of diseased bodies took place. So, the argument goes, the houses were situated away from the church to be in a much healthier position.

I have been asked to write in the Community News about another explanation for this phenomenon, which I have arrived at after many years of visiting sacred sites all across Britain, and also abroad. Many years ago I came across a book called 'The Pattern of the Past', by Guy Underwood. At the time when he wrote it, he was a museum curator. He therefore published it posthumously, as his findings would have caused him some trouble with his scientific colleagues, as his findings did not accord with any known science. He showed in his illustrations the so called 'energy lines' that he had found by dowsing under churches and other ancient sites. It was an extension of the well-known ability of dowsers ability to detect underground water. As a dowser myself, I was able to check on all this information, using my faculty. It appeared that our ancestors marked these 'telluric' energies by erecting stone edifices, which were adapted especially for these sites. We do not know for certain what form these took, but they were based on the Old Religion of Nature. Standing stones is one possibility, and one of these may indeed be incorporated in St Mary's on the South side.

But what we do know is that Pope Gregory the Great ordered St Augustine

and his followers not to destroy what he would have called the 'heathen temples', but to build on top of them. The new converts could thus stay and worship on the same sites that they had already occupied. This would keep everyone on the side of St Augustine and his Christian religion.

Thus the first Christian churches were not built for a village. They were erected on the same sites which had previously been marked out by the old sacred places. Church spires were constructed by the masons to embellish and perhaps magnify the effect of the spiral energies, described by Underwood as 'Blind Springs.' Masons kept their trade secrets, but it is likely that dowsing was used by the Master Masons. Other 'dowsable energy lines affected the construction of the rest of the buildings, such as the angle of the knave to the chancel and the position of the doors. Dwelling houses then came to be built around some of these churches in the rural areas, but the church was already there.

Even primitive societies leave behind some relics or traces of their existence. As our family farm adjoins the Hastingleigh church, I had expected to find some evidence of former human habitation in its environment to turn up. But nothing has ever appeared. Once, I was excited to learn that one field nearby had been called 'Six Houses', only to be told that it was due to the six chicken houses which formerly occupied the site. Thus so far no evidence has come forward to make me change my mind. Certainly the Black Death could be an explanation for the isolation of the church from the rest of the village. But I put forward my personal solution of the problem as one worthy of consideration.

FROM WYE CHURCH

I am, of course, one of a dying breed, brought up in the war and the austerity of rationing years after. I resonate with the "brown paper packages tied up with strings" in the "Sound of Music", on yet again at Christmas! As we undid them, all the paper and string was carefully preserved for future use. Thrift was the order of the day.

The story is told of a very old Scotsman, (perhaps one of my ancestors?), proud of his lifelong prudence, who was nearing the end of his life. His family gathered round him. "Wife, where are you?" "I'm here my darling", she replied, taking his hand. "Son, where are you?" "I'm here too Dad." "And daughter where are you?" "I'm here Dad, right by your side". "OK", says the old man, "then why is the light on in the kitchen?" I used to be very irritated by my step-father who went round the house turning off the lights. Now, I do the same, and so should we all.

Reduce, re-use, recycle.*

WyeCycle point out that moving garden waste to the household-waste site and then to the composting site some miles away, uses valuable resources and emits a lot of carbon gas rather than the relatively small cost of doing it locally. Things are improving but we still have far to go.

But I am only allowed 400+ words, so I had better get to the point!

More and more of us are mobile phone and computer users. I am using ink writing this. Mobiles and the like use rare earths, that is, unusual materials and minerals. Presently China has is the main source of supply. One by-product of the extraction of some is radio-active waste.

Each phone contains up to a few grams of rare earths. That might not seem like much, but when you add up the over 500 million retired cell phones that live in desk drawers, closets, and shoe-boxes, you see the possibilities. Recycling old electronics will not only free up valuable rare earths, but also copper, gold, palladium, and platinum. Think of your used cell phone as a miniature gold mine. Currently only 1% get re-cycled.

On-line you may find that you can get a good price for some makes. In Ashford you can get money for taking your ink-cartridges back. How much better to help those in our one world in great need. Please use the enclosed envelope. If you have nothing now, keep it till you have or pass it on.


