In The Garden

any may argue that September is the start of the gardening year. If we have managed to avoid the heat waves, wild fires, droughts and floods that have afflicted so many other parts of the world and even other parts of the UK, then generally the weather is sliding into autumn and an 'Indian summer' may bless us with steady warm days before the first frosts start to nip our toes and fingers.

Harvesting autumn raspberries from canes that have grown from the ground up since spring can be a particular pleasure together with the smell of ripening apples on the bough, although this year the curious spring has brought a mixed bag to our few apple trees. Our Bramley apple 'on which we rely for unsurpassed cookers' has hardly any fruit this time for when it was flowering the pollinators were hardly to be seen the weather was so cold. On the other hand the wild crabs have, somehow, plenty of fruit.

Now is a good time to plant spring flowering bulbs. A head start can be made with crocuses, daffodils, hyacinth, scillas and winter aconites. Tulips are better left until October or even November. The approach of autumn can bring with it a second flowering. Albeit intermittently, of a number of the shrubs whose main flowering period is much earlier in the year. Of these, many of the roses may be relied upon to provide a second flush of bloom, often going on right into winter. Late clematis prolong the season and may be employed to enliven shrubs and trees that no longer command centre stage.

Sow annuals for spring. Very hardy annuals sown now will flower much earlier than those sown in the spring. Sown in trays of modules under glass and then potted on they can be kept in a cold greenhouse or frame and set out in beds as soon as the worst of the weather is over in the early spring.

The last of the main crop potatoes should be dug up for storage before the slugs home in on them and increase their damage. Hands up those who have never left behind rogue tubers that cheekily pop up in the spring to infuriate you when you swear you dug the beds three times to prevent just such a happening!

If you net brassicas to keep pigeons and cabbage white butterflies from attacking them (mesh no bigger that 7mm to keep the latter out), these should be changed for wider meshed nets that will still keep the pigeons out but let any snow that falls in the winter filter through and not catch on the nets and damage them by weighing them down. Likewise for the roof nets of fruit cages which should be removed.

Greenhouses and cold frames can be cleaned out and, if necessary, fumigated to rid them of bugs to give a clean start for late autumn and winter cropping with endive and herbs such as chervil, coriander and wild rocket to enhance your salads.

With a good September, delicious sweet corn can be harvested and ripening squashes can be lifted clear of the ground with a piece of wood or a small branch so they are clear of any wet soil as they fully ripen for storage.

Road Closures


e seem to be experiencing many road closures in and around our area at the moment.

Wye PPG

ye Surgery PPG AGM took place in Wye Parish Church on 11 August. It was delayed this year to allow for a face-to-face meeting – our first since March 2020, although regular meetings have continued online. It was attended by Dr Miles and Practice Manager Helen Goodman, who presented some NHS facts and figures which gave us all pause for thought.

There are now 3 million more patients and 3,000 fewer GPs than ten years ago and the number of patients per practice is 22% higher than it was in 2015. Wye Surgery now has 9,200 patients compared with under 8,000 a few years ago. Unfortunately, the GP workforce has not kept pace with increased demand, so there are now just 0.46 fully qualified GPs per 1000 patients in England - down from 0.52 in 2015. Including the trend towards online appointments, the number of same day or next day appointments is now 25% higher than in March 2019.

The adverse trends look set to continue. Practices are closing at the rate of 3 per week and GPs are leaving the profession at the rate of three per day. GP surveys show that 50% of respondents said they are currently suffering from depression, anxiety, stress, burn-out, or another mental health condition. Of those 40% are suffering 'worse than before the start of the pandemic'.

We are fortunate to have a new medical school at Canterbury and hopefully this will increase the local supply of Drs wanting to live and work in Kent, but it takes ten years to fully train a GP and it will be a while before we feel the beneficial impact.

So where does this leave us as patients? The pandemic has exacerbated an already understaffed and underfunded situation in which the main burden has fallen and will continue to fall on NHS primary care services. The work force is exhausted, but so are we as patients, having struggled with online systems, social isolation and acute anxiety about friends and family over a prolonged period.

Patients and practitioners now need to come together to examine

the provisions of the new Health and Social Care Bill currently before Parliament. It has received very little publicity but, according to the Kings Fund, it represents the biggest shake up of NHS services since its inception. We must watch this space very carefully.

Farming Notebook

The sun is up and shining (at last!) and so begins another day as harvest finally gets underway.

A fortnight later than normal the combine was out in the oilseed rape on August 7th. Cutting started at moisture of 20%, far too high - our contract for sale states under 10%. However with the summer storms increasing the threat of pod shatter and thus seed loss, we really had no choice.

The yields were pleasing, but did not quite match the expectation as the crop looked so good throughout the growing season. In the end the lack of sunshine took its toll and it turned into a more "average year". Recent research looking at oilseed rape yields confirms that temperature, radiation and drought stress in the period from flower buds present to end of pod fill can reduce yield by up to 40%.

Next to go was the grass seed, a very challenging part of the harvest this year. Far later than normal we put the combine into what looked more like a green silage crop than a dry, ripe seed crop. We use a special header on the combine for grass seed. A "stripper" header. As the name suggests, it has a rotor on which there are row upon row of fingers which rotate at speed and are designed to strip the seed off the stems, leaving the latter firmly fixed to the soil. It is a little like using a flea comb on the dog! The hairs are combed but the flea (seed) remains on the comb. The major benefit is that the combine is not having to deal with a wet, green mass of vegetation and is only having to sort the seed from the chaff. In a normal year this system works perfectly...

This year the grass crop was battered by the incessant rains and pummelled to the ground. The ripening seed heads were left very close to ground. As yet more rain fell the grass plants started to grow again and put up lush new growth that grew through the seed bearing stems. Shielded from any sunshine and out of the wind the seed crop began to look very sorry for itself. The stripper header did a sterling job of combing the seed through the new growth. The combine did

an equally amazing job of putting a seed sample in the tank. But it was so wet that it would not come out of the tank! Every tankful had to be prodded with a stick to get it out and into the trailer. Not a happy task. The unloading auger frequently jammed solid with compacted grass seed, which resembled Stirling board, which took hours to clear. By the time the trailers were tipped in the grain store the seeds were already beginning to heat up. It was essential to get air through the crop to keep it cool and ventilated to avoid damaging the germination of the seeds. The crop was so wet that it was three days before the moisture meter even registered a figure, and that was still far too wet. Even laid out in a layer no more than a foot deep, with good air flow, the heap very soon sealed over. So the whole crop had to be removed from the drying floor and then replaced. This job was undertaken every two days! Eventually after over a week the moisture was approaching a level where the grass seed could be safely stored and the seed felt "crisp". With the addition of a little heat we finally got the crop dry. Many are less fortunate, with large areas of seed having been written off. Eleven month's work for nothing...

It is somewhat ironic that in a difficult season, yields are down, quality is down, there is always additional work to be done in harvesting and subsequent drying and to cap it all the calendar is ticking by leaving less time to prepare for next season's planting. (For optimum planting of the 2022 oilseed rape crop we now have only five days to cut the wheat, bale the straw, cart the straw, apply fertiliser, cultivate the ground and plant the seed!)

Having completed our, and our two neighbour's, grass seed harvesting, it is on to the wheat. Much easier combining- a real treat after what had gone before. The first sample needs a bit of cleaning, some unthrashed tips of the ear and, from the edge of the field, a few grass weed seeds will be removed by the cleaner in the grain store. As suspected, specific weights are down some 10-15% on last year and thus having a significant effect of yields, which due to the lack of sunshine in June were already compromised. At least market prices are rising in response to a variety of global weather events in major grain producing areas which are combining to put severe

pressure on the supply/demand ratio.

The potatoes have reached their seed size and have been topped and sprayed off. There will be very careful monitoring for regrowth of the tops. Small fresh leaves are honeytraps for aphids, which could still inject virus into the plants, and are also a focus for potato blight, which could still spread down into the tubers.

The yields of the different varieties again reflect strongly the weather. Sagitta, an earlier maturing variety was trying to set tubers in that ghastly weather window, so did not fare so well. Yields, from our sample digs look lower than normal. Sagitta is a variety of great promise though, good for chips, mash and boiling.

For the maincrops, Melody (for cooking, a good all rounder) and Markies (a frier, but also makes nice potato salad!), our test digs indicate good tuber numbers and fill. So hopefully that will be reflected in trailer loads off the field!

We are now approaching the autumn grazing season, when grass quality declines, so we have to manage the pastures carefully to keep the suckler cows in the correct condition and the liveweight gain of the store cattle going forward.

Here I need to introduce you to Sussex cow number 110, who is one of our smallest cows, with the biggest appetite, that produces the most beautiful calves with no problems. She is like a grass productivity monitor. Wherever, the grazing is getting short or less palatable, 110 gets the fidgets and will roar when she sees you. She is the biological version of the latest micro-sonic grass quality measuring sensor. The more she roars, the more we have to consider a little supplementary feed..

That means now the troughs go out to the field and we begin feeding a few rolled oats with minerals which ensures that cattle receive their trace element requirement as well as a little something to keep their tummies warm. The calves still have access to their ad-lib creep feeders.

The sun has now set and I am just off to close up the grain store at the end of long day...
