

Electronic Prescriptions and Nominated Pharmacies.

You can now choose where you would like your prescription dispensed – just tell Wye surgery.

When you order a repeat prescription (in your usual way), there is now a new, hopefully more convenient system for dispensing. The doctor signs the prescription and it will then be sent electronically to your nominated pharmacy. You can change your nominated pharmacy by speaking to the pharmacy, dispensary or updating it online.

All the pharmacies are vying for business (as they do for Flu jabs) so are asking you to nominate them. You will probably have seen advertisements in supermarkets and chemists. If you live outside the village of Wye the Surgery can dispense prescriptions for you. They are keen to

keep your business as it brings in financial revenue to the surgery. There are some online services like 'Pharmacy to You', which provide a useful deliver to door service but are not connected to the NHS.

One of the advantages of this system is that if you are away from home (in England) and require a prescription, you can nominate the pharmacy in that temporary location and get your prescription there. You need to remember to change the nomination to your normal pharmacy when you are back home.

The online Patient Access holds your current information regarding prescriptions and you just have to tick which item you require, so you can order what you want, when you want it. If you are not yet signed up for Patient Access and would like to use it, speak to a Receptionist in the Surgery who will help you. When ordering your repeat prescription please remember to only tick the medicines you require, which may not be everything on the prescription!

'So they do say...!'

raveyards are difficult to keep tidy due to the uneven ground and of course, the gravestones. But the charm of them is in the contemplation of centuries of lives gone and old gravestones. They should remain in this state however difficult maintenance becomes.

St Mary's has a photograph album of most of the graveyard stones some of which are almost illegible by daylight, but at night, when a torch is held sideways-on to the inscription, the lettering can clearly be seen. Curiously, even when the outer layer of stone has fallen away leaving a smooth surface, the effect of the engraving tool impresses the letters more deeply than we may realise. The torch beam at night will reveal the faint inscription. Thomas Hardy was a frequent graveyard visitor:

TW

I went by footpath and by stile Beyond where bustle ends Strayed here a mile and there a mile And called upon some friends.


I spoke to one and other of them

Kate's Puddings

Lemon Meringue Pie

This is my husband's all-time favourite, and nobody can make it as well as his mother.

There are many different recipes, but hers is definitely the best – a light pastry base, tangy, sharp lemon centre and a crisp meringue top which breaks to a softness underneath....

Rich Shortcrust Pastry:

8oz/225g plain flour, pinch salt, plus 4oz/100g butter, plus 1 egg, beaten

Lemon Filling:

2 tbsps cornflour slaked with 1 tbsp water

½ pint/300ml hot water 4oz/110g caster sugar 2 lemons, fine zest and juice 1oz/25g butter 3 egg yolks

Meringue top:

3 egg whites

6oz/150g caster sugar

Preheat the oven to 200 deg C. Make the pastry and bake blind. Allow the case to cool (you can do this part the day before).

Turn the oven to 160 deg C. Heat the water in a pan.

Slake the cornflour in 1 tbsp cold water, and then add the hot water to it, before putting it all back into the pan. Add the lemon rind and juice, then the sugar. As the lemon mixture comes to the boil and thickens, add the butter and mix it in, then take the pan off the heat and add the eggs, one by one, mixing well (otherwise you get scrambled egg). If it is not already thick, put the pan back onto a gentle heat and stir the mixture until it is thick. Pour it into the pastry case.

Whisk the egg whites until stiff, then add the sugar slowly. Completely cover the pie with the meringue, making sure that none of the lemon filling can be seen. Bake for about 10-15 minutes or so until the meringue has hardened on the top but not browned – if it is starting to brown, turn the oven down further and put some foil over the top of the pie. Helen usually turns the oven off and leaves the meringue longer.

Farming Notebook

Rain at last!

here is much to celebrate...

Rain. The long hot summer was brought back to normality with some significant rainfall on the 10th August. We had pushed on with combining and managed to bring in the oilseed rape, winter barley, herbage seed and all the wheat by the 9th! All very dry, but also very hot. Some of the wheat came into store at 36 degrees C. This gave us the unusual challenge of getting the temperature down rather than the moisture content. A pile of unventilated hot grains can be just as problematic to store as a crop that is wet.

Harvest. Not a record breaker, but generally a good one so far. Oilseeds have been a little disappointing. Having looked good all year, it seems as though the rape suffered the most from the extreme temperatures. The moisture content was only 6% - one percent above the minimum allowed, and the seeds very small.

Barley was very respectable, with a good grain size. Our first foray into herbage seed was easy and with a good yield. We used a stripper header for the first time. Not a new concept but a very effective way of harvesting grass. In the old days, when selling a combine the salesman would ask if it had been used for grass seed. This was because the crop was always green and strained every component of the machine and effectively halved its value! The stripper header does exactly what the name suggests. It strips the seeds from the stems by using what can best be described as high speed back combing. All the green stems remain standing and only the seeds pass through the combine. Once the seed has been harvested the grass is then mown and baled as thrashed hay. Wheats were very pleasing with a good yield and a lovely sample. Only spring oats and spring beans are left for the combine and they will both be harvested as soon as the weather allows.

And then there is me! I have reached the milestone of farming here at High Chimney Farm for forty years. On Friday 21st July 1978 I had formally completed my studies at Wye College and was now set on a new and exciting adventure. The weekend was spent planning the week ahead and my first job was to drive the "Thames" minibus (a fore-

runner of the Ford Transit) around the locality collecting the strawberry picking ladies. A baptism of fire!!

Evenings were spent mastering wages, PAYE, VAT, book keeping and sifting through the trickle of paper from the EEC. (little did I know that the trickle would become a deluge of rules and regulation...) If I had any time left I would fine tune my five year plan! This involved a great deal of colouring in of maps to plan rotations. The plans never lasted for more than a few weeks before the "new" five year plan was needed. Although I still colour in maps, I quickly learnt that you have to be flexible and farm within the rules that apply at the time. As rules change then so does the farming.

It seems as though not much has changed, but in reality farming now is very different to farming forty years ago. Yes, the seasons come and go, the weather keeps you on your toes and there has always been a harvest. But for me the farm is a very different place.

In 1978 well over half the farm was in fruit. Mainly apples, but also strawberries and gooseberries. The gooseberries did not last long! Strawberries were grown for the fresh wholesale markets and for

processing. I used the same minibus to transport trays and trays of freshly picked fruit to the jam factory at Sittingbourne having taken all the ladies home first. This enterprise lasted for several years and the apples right through until 1991.

In 1978 I bought my first sheep. A hundred Kent ewes and tegs from Harry Hollands, who farmed at Mead Farm. I also got my first dog "Bess", a border collie. I learnt how to shear.

Farms have got bigger. 75 acres was a viable unit in 1978, now you need ten times as much - or even 300 Hectares! There are fewer farmers, and the numbers of people who earn their living working on the land reduces year on year. Tractors have got bigger, but fewer in number. Fields have got bigger. Cereal yields have doubled, and prices in real terms have halved.

Some of the biggest changes have been in plant protection. Chemistry has taken huge steps forward from the "sledgehammer to crack a nut" science of the post war years. Bayleton "Big ears" was the first of a new generation of fungicides that helped crops reach their full potential. Roundup was a new herbicide that killed couch grass down to the roots. No longer were we feeding the grass weeds as well as the crop.

Plant breeding too has raised the

bar year on year for quality and yield. Maris Huntsman, a record breaker of its day, is now eclipsed by Zyatt. A new high quality bread making wheat with a yield potential double that expected in 1978.

Every year margins are squeezed and higher levels of efficiency are required. Cutting waste and attention to detail are necessities. GPS guidance on tractors is now becoming the norm. With it comes auto section control for sprayers. Each nozzle individually controlled by satellite. Overlaps are now down to centimetres instead of metres. Less overlaps means higher levels of

safety and less waste. Less chemical, less seed, less wearing metal, less fuel, less time, less fatigue for the operator, higher efficiency and higher margins.

Change is a necessity, and is both exciting and interesting, but it is the things that don't change that are just as enjoyable. Forget the horizontal driving rain, the gales, the slushy snow, and the wet cold. Autumn colours with a heavy dew, a hard frost, spring turnout of the cattle and the dust and heat of harvest, these are what make me look forward to 2019...
