Hastingleigh with Elmsted WI

astingleigh with Elmsted W.I. met on Thursday the 5th of March 2020 at the Evington Hall. 18 members attended.

We discussed various items of business before our speaker. Ms Sheila Caulfield, gave us a talk entitled How to Declutter and Organise your Wardrobe. Sheila started by telling us that women wear 20% of their wardrobes 80% of the time. The purpose of clothing, apart from keeping us warm, is to empower you to look, sound and feel confident. Colour in clothing is important as it is the strongest indicator of who we are, who we think we are, and who we want to be. Decluttering isn't about clearing out things only to replace them with more things. Sheila advised us to start by thinking about what activities we spend most of our time doing, and the acceptable dress code for these activities. Once you are ready to begin decluttering, you should start by taking everything out of your wardrobe, and sort it into 3 piles; suits me and I wear it, don't currently wear it and never wear it. The 'suits me' pile will go straight back in the wardrobe and everything in the 'never wear' goes, either to charity or sell it. The 'I don't currently wear' pile needs to be sorted by asking questions such as 'does the colour suit me?', 'does it fit?', 'impulse buy?'. If the answer to the first two questions is no, then they need to go. Once you've sorted you need to become a better shopper and only buy if you need, rather than just want. Sheila also advised that accessories are a great buy as they can be used to change the look of an outfit, making it suitable for many different occasions.

The Flower of the Month winner for March was Sally Morley-Smith, and the winner of the March competition, a useless item you can't bear to throw away, was Sara Nixon, with a large wooden bobbin.

Our next meeting, on Thursday the 2nd April has been cancelled in accordance with the guidance on social distancing. We will be reviewing the situation as it unfolds, as to whether or not the May meeting will go ahead.

In The Garden

ast month I was writing about mowing lawns. Ha! Now I am writing mid March and still the rainy wet weather has not stopped so the mowers are firmly shut in the shed – but ready to go.

I'm still behind with pruning trees, shrubs, soft fruit bushes and also mulching with compost and wood chips. All because of the wet weather is my excuse and so when the rain does stop and the ground dries up it will be all 'systems go' just as it will be for our neighbouring farmers.

With Coronavirus expanding apace it looks as though a lot of us are going to be staying at home more than usual and this will give us an opportunity to make the most of our gardens. April is a busy, busy month anyway. Order bedding plants or plugs and for hanging baskets. If not already done clean and scrub the greenhouse and fumigate it to remove unwanted bugs. Preparing beds by forking over and applying well rotted manure or compost has been a bad joke up to now, but it will not be too late as the soil starts to dry, it will appreciate it and everything will begin to catch up. I've been able to cover my compost heaps with waterproof sheets and those that were made last summer heated up nicely which will have killed a lot of weeds and should not be too wet to spread.

Perennial plants can be lifted and divided; this will improve their vigour and create new plants for your garden or to give away. Hostas can be divided before they come into leaf and primroses once their flowering is over. The dampness in the soil still means that feeding your shrubs and perennial flowers with a slow release fertiliser, hoed in if possible, will do them some good. Generally, winter and early flowering plants, such as forsythia and heathers can all be pruned back as flowering finishes to keep their sturdiness and shape good. Other plants like clematis and honeysuckle will be growing away and need tying in so that their later display of flowers will be seen at their best – you can see that I am an optimist and really do expect some marvellous spring and summer weather to arrive.

If you are incarcerated at home with one person designated to do the shopping etc., may be they can be persuaded to bring back some bags of seed or multi-purpose compost to help propagate some vegetable seeds

on window sills or the greenhouse, if you have one. The autumn sown broad beans looked rather miserable all winter even though they grew quite a bit whereas the spring sown beans in the greenhouse look great and some of this may be due to an improved temperature there due to a good electric heater and, for the propagator, a new thermostat. All the broad beans were covered with a lightweight fleece as they were planted out laid straight on the plants for a while for this holds the heat close to them and counteracts the lack of full light at this time of year.

The first more hardy round seeded peas have been sown together with early carrots and radish. And a word about sowing carrots – I make a shallow drill and do my best to sow the carrot seeds about a centimetre apart (to reduce the amount of time spent thinning as they grow). Instead of raking the soil over the seed drill I back fill it up to soil level with bought multi-purpose compost before watering it well. Seems to help germination a lot. Not my idea but one I picked up from Bob Flowerdew on the radio Gardeners' Question Time. Now, with me, do your really believe that is his real name – seems almost unbelievable for a gardener! Lettuce and French Breakfast radish from modules are planted out in the warmth of the greenhouse and the first tomatoes have been planted on in small pots before they go out in the greenhouse except for one variety that I have never grown before – Crimson Crush – that, it is claimed is highly resistant to blight and therefore good for planting outdoors as well as undercover.

'So they do say.!

n the 1st August, 1754, a 23 year old woman from Hastingleigh was found guilty by the Consistory Court of Canterbury of fornication in Lyminge, and sentenced to do Penance in Lyminge Church by wearing a white sheet and carrying a white wand. She was required repeat the following confession before the clergy and congregation, 'Now I do here before God and his Congregation humbly confess and Acknowledge such my Great Wickedness for which I am heartily sorry and penitent beseeching Almighty God to forgive the same and my neighbours to be satisfied with this my penitent confession and I promise by God's Grace to live more chastely and honestly for the time to come which God grant I may perform. Amen' This was standard wording for this crime. Eleanor died on the 27th October 1760 aged 27 and was buried at St Mary's Church, Hastingleigh, grave No105.

On the 7th January 1615, Adam Gosham, a labourer in Hastingleigh, broke into and entered the barn of Richard Hawke who lived at South Hill Farm, and stole 'one bushell of oates' worth 10d, belonging to the said Richard Hawke. He acknowledged the indictment and was whipped.

Wye Surgery PPG

e-CONSULT ONLINE CONSULTATION

n March 16 Wye Surgery went live with the new e-Consult online system for contacting your GP. e-Consult replaces 'Ask my GP'. It may be accessed through the surgery website (wyesurgery.co.uk) and it enables patients to submit their symptoms electronically 24 hours a day 7 days a week and receive a reply by the next working day either by text message, email or telephone. e-Consult was piloted by GP practices in the West of England and is now used by over 1200 GP practices, including other practices in the Ashford Primary Care Network.

The app requires patients to answer a series of questions and the answers will sign-post them to the most appropriate care, including a face to face appointment, self-help, advice from a pharmacy or a simple administrative response (a sick note or access to test results without the need for an appointment). e-Consult includes a Red Flag alerting system that identifies potential critical illnesses and fast-tracks GPs' responses.

One advantage of the new system is that it will remove the need to queue up on the telephone at 8 o'clock in the morning, as it can be submitted at any time of the day or night. It is also timely, as surgeries are facing unprecedented demand as a result of the corona virus pandemic. e- Consult will allow patients to have access to clinical advice from GPs without having to come into the surgery, reducing the risk of infection spreading to other patients and/or to surgery staff.

The new system should reduce waiting times before clinical decisions are reached and could release more GP time for face-to-face appointments. e- Consult is a more advanced system than 'Ask my GP' as it allows more space for free text to describe their symptoms. It is also safer for the patient allowing the Dr to identify urgent cases quickly, rather than risking them being the last in a telephone queue when all the appointments are gone for the day. Clearly, not all patients can use the Internet and there are separate arrangements for children under 6 months old.

Online consultation services do require a change of culture and mindset as we move away from the traditional face-to-face visits to the Dr, but online technology is capable of offering innovative new ways of maximizing the clinical resources we have available.

Farming Notebook

ell, it is official, and you heard it here first.... The sun shone all day yesterday, it was warm and the skies were blue. It really felt like spring. It felt good.

Another sign of optimism was the start of calving. Two cows have had calves, both very bonny bulls. Both mums gave birth unaided. One was a heifer - a first time mother – which can sometimes be problematic. The calves got up and found the milk bar all by themselves, and both offspring are charging around playing in the straw. Let's hope that the rest of calving goes as smoothly. Either way, it is a good start.

It all worked out very well. We had moved some of the Sussex cattle which had calved at Christmas time out on to some free draining permanent pasture, and then cleaned out the barn. The pen was strawed down as preparation for calving. Expecting a week at least before the first calf, it was a pleasant surprise to find two the very next day! Apart from wanting to prepare a nursery, we were also acutely aware that our straw and silage supplies are going to run out by the end of April. It has been such a long winter. Turning some of the cattle out early, even if it is really still a bit wet underfoot, will help conserve some of the bedding and forage.

On the arable side we are desperate to get some more fertiliser onto all the crops. Our view is, that with the saturated soils, and forecasts of yet more rain, that a "little and often" approach to feeding the crops will make best use of the nutrients. Everything had 40kg/ha of Nitrogen (+Sulphur) in February, and the intention is to go over everything again with another 40kg/ha of straight Nitrogen as soon as possible.

All the earlier sown wheats look fine, even the later sown fields look OK, but the oilseed rape is so slow getting away. The plants are there, but they are just not moving. I have a daily trek across the field putting out banger ropes to keep the pigeons away to give the crop the best chance. It really does need some warm weather. At the moment it is difficult to imagine the crop in full flower in 6 weeks time....

It was only a few weeks ago that all the discussion amongst farmers was how late was it safe to plant winter wheat. (Winter wheat needs to vernalise, which basically means it needs a frost to trigger its seed production phase). It is generally accepted that that window of opportunity is now closed. Ironically the discussion is now on how late can we plant spring crops! We are several weeks behind in planting spring beans. It is already past the time for spring wheat. We live in hope that the developing high pressure in the forecasts actually happens and that we do get a few warmer days without rain. It is interesting that, this year's crops that are poorer than we would like, are regarded as having potential. In most years we might consider ploughing them in and starting again. This year it is definitely "a bird in the hand....". Having a poor crop is better than having no crop at all!

The world around us is in turmoil. The markets are in meltdown. This includes commodities. We have yet to strike a price for our oilseed rape which was collected last autumn. The values have fallen sharply and I fear may not recover before I have to sell. Ho hum....I have to accept the situation-there is really nothing that I can do to alter it.

I do take issue with the media, broadcast media in particular. The government position on Covid 19 has been led by advice from the chief medical officer, who himself will have had advice from a wide range of experts. The guidance has been measured and, in my view, well explained. Always with a caveat that things may have to change at short notice. The media, however, go out of their way to find an "expert" who will contradict the advice given and propose alternative strategies. More air time and debate is given to this expert than the official view. All this leads to is scare mongering. It is the debate on the MMR vaccinination all over again. The media have to take no small amount of the blame that mumps is on the increase, with occasionally fatal results.

While I am on the subject, who is it that shows rows and rows of empty shelves on every news bulletin, with statements that loo rolls may run out and food may become short? Do the media ever stop and think that they may be the cause of the panic buying. They, of course would never agree.... (One Australian newspaper had an eight page centre "pull out" relating to the loo roll shortage. Each page was clearly marked as to where to cut it and where to punch the hole for the string! - I had to laugh...)

Forever the optimist, I am looking forward to being busy next week getting on with field work at last. Now where is my factor 30......
