FOOTPATH WALK 28th FEBRUARY

Twelve walkers and a dog set forth from Orchard Heights on a bright day but with a bitterly cold northerly wind. A tarmac path led straight to the bridge over the high-speed railway line. The footpath skirts round what was once the rear of the Templar Barracks to join the Greensand Way past Godinton Park Estate. Money from the development of the housing has enabled the restoration of Godinton House and Gardens.

Now on pastureland with sheep grazing in the next field we leave the urban behind. Where the way joins the track from Godinton House to Great Chart a large finger post directs us to Great Chart or back to Potters Corner. Soon afterwards it is possible to see Godinton House by glancing over the right shoulder. Over the River Stour the walk turns westerly along the Stour Valley Way; a stile into the next field gives a choice of two paths. We take the right fork keeping on the Stour Valley Way to cross the river again. Through into the next field we then head north on a permissive path; to our left is the wood yard with its wood chip enterprise.

Crossing the drive and through a gap in the hedge we suddenly emerge into the teeth of a wintry shower blown in on a stiff breeze. After a muddy section we reached the shelter of Godinton plantation and turned east through the woodland brightened by patches of primroses. We are on the Greensand Way again. The hedge next to Godinton Lane has recently been layered. The second and last stile (awkwardly narrow) brings us into the parkland. Two Eurostar trains and a javelin train whisk by in quick succession. The path crosses the main house drive in view of the North Lodge House at the main gate, a grassy walk until we enter a short stretch of woodland and retrace our steps at the back of the old barracks and over the railway line again to the cars and a welcome cup of tea at Hilary's.

NELSON

Nelson was my neighbour. His home was the little white cottage by the pond, which was attached to The White House, where my family used to live. In the early days, before our side of the house was extended, the bathroom was downstairs and he used to tease me that there was a secret hole in the wall which he could peep through and see me in the bath! In my view, however, he was the perfect gentleman. Once a year, he would knock on my door and give me a bunch of flowers. At another time of the year, he



would do the same to my lovely friend, Sonia, who lived in the Bowl Field. We never knew why he chose us in particular, but both of us felt very honoured by these gestures of friendship. I think that Nelson valued his independence above everything and the only times I ever heard him raise his voice was when his sister used to visit and was probably nagging him for not looking after himself properly. From the language he used and the tone of his voice, I could tell it was all tongue in cheek. Although this poem (following on the next page) was written in 1994, my memory of Nelson has in no way dimmed. What a character he was! We were privileged and lucky to have him as part of our village life.

HASTINGLEIGH WITH ELMSTED W.I.

Hastingleigh with Elmsted W.I. met on Thursday the 3rd of March at the Evington Hall.

Seventeen members attended our meeting.

We started our meeting with a minute's silence in memory of one of our members, Vera Possnicker, and two other past members who had recently passed away.

We discussed places to visit with our link W.I. in West Kent. Various gardens were mentioned, and we hope to be able to visit one with them.

Our speakers this month were Margaret Hanlon and Janet Shears, talking about Canterbury Oast Trust. Mrs Hanlon is a volunteer there, and Mrs Shears' son is supported by the charity. The Oast Trust celebrated its 30th anniversary last year. They have 18 homes and support 93 adults with learning difficulties, helping them into meaningful work experiences. They started with two houses in Aldington, and the next houses they acquired in Rye are still going strong as tea rooms. The adults learn a wide array of experiences – animal husbandry (from guinea pigs to Shire horses), art and crafts, horticulture, catering and care. The Trust receives statutory funding from the government, and they fundraise on top of that.

The flower of the month competition was won by Mrs. Pearson.

Our next meeting will be held on Thursday the 7th of April at 7.30 p.m. in the Evington Hall, when our speaker will be Mr. Eric Spear, talking to us about 'Flights of fancy – a world tour of iconic sights.' Any new members will be made most welcome.

The Lorry Way Down (update to Beginning March 2016).

The last time I wrote for the Community News, we had just arrived in Swakopmund on the coast in Namibia, well we ended up staying there for just over three weeks. It's the perfect spot to get various things done on the truck, we ended up with a service, then getting the exhaust welded up (I was expecting the worse and expected to find the silencer rotted through, but bizarrely one of the massive mounting straps/brackets had actually worn through the thick plate, this goes to show the stresses put through the truck on these "roads").

Whilst parked up all the locks were treated to a good lubrication (the sand and dust gets everywhere), and we finally got rid of the dreaded carpet tiles, and replaced these with some very nice swish oak effect plastic click-in flooring. This took a full day to fit as there was so much cutting around various obstructions such as the WC, and door openings, and of course all my carpentry tools are safely locked away in storage! But Jac is pleased with the result, and it is now a much easier job to just sweep up the sand rather than brushing furiously at the deep pile carpet tiles, with it all flicking up and over the dustpan! Within ten minutes of the dirty old carpet tiles hitting the campsite bin, they were all washed and laid out to dry by the campsite staff, nothing goes to waste in Africa!

I also mentioned previously that we were sweating on a decision by the ADAC in Germany as to whether or not they would issue us (a UK registered vehicle) with a new Carnet de Passage, as the RAC unexpectedly (and without notice) withdrew issuing them. Well I'm pleased to tell you that they are issuing the Carnet to us, and so will continue our travels for up to another 12 months. The German Carnet is also about 25% of the cost of an identical Carnet from the RAC. So all in all a very pleasing resolution to this potential

problem.

With this in mind we have also got the DAF ready for East Africa, with Zambia and Zimbabwe in particular with reflective yellow tape down the sides, red tape on the rear, and white tape on the front. Hopefully this will reduce the possible problems at the numerous road blocks in Zim and Zam,

but only time will tell I guess.

and at 2.5m wide, by 3.5m high, cutting 0.6m off the length reduces our cubic meterage by over 5.0m3 and the current rate is over £100, per cubic m including surcharges. It has also taken off about 100kg of weight that was suspended well out the back of the truck. The metal work was recycled by the campsite staff.

We have left Colonel K in a huge alarmed shed about 10km from Windhoek Airport, and this at a very reasonable cost of £1.00 per day (including electric

hookup to keep the batteries fully charged).

So by the time you read this, I'm sure that we will have met up with quite a few of Hastingleigh's residents (a trip to The Bowl is definitely on the cards). We are really looking forward to seeing family and friends while in Kent, and especially my sister who is quite poorly at the moment.

I'm sure that by the time we return to Africa (end of March) we will be raring to go on the next phase of our travels up the East side of Africa, and then returning to South Africa for finally shipping back to Europe.

CONFUSION AROUND HRT

There is a great deal of confusion surrounding HRT and the trial evidence published several years ago led to many women stopping HRT and many more deciding not to start taking it. Much of this evidence has now been reassessed.

The menopause is quite disabling for some women and relatively trivial for others. The main symptoms tend to be mood swings, flushes, sleeplessness and aches and pains. Later the lack of hormones tends to lead to vaginal dryness causing painful intercourse, discharge and occasionally bleeding.

So what do we know about the risks and benefits of HRT? Fortunately NICE produced an updated report last year that has clarified some of the points.

Menopause is when you stop having periods, which usually happens between the ages of 45 and 55. For a small number of women menopause occurs earlier. If it happens before you are 40 it's called premature menopause.

Menopause happens when your ovaries stop producing a hormone called oestrogen and no longer release eggs. For some time before this – it could be for a few months or for several years – your periods may become less regular as your oestrogen levels fall. This is called perimenopause.

Hot flushes and night sweats

Hot flushes and night sweats are common in menopause. If you are finding them a problem you should be offered HRT after discussing the benefits and risks. If you have a womb you should be offered HRT that contains oestrogen and progestogen. This is because oestrogen-only HRT can be harmful to the lining of the womb. If you don't have a womb you should be offered oestrogen-only HRT.

Some women find that the dietary supplements black cohosh and isoflavones can reduce their hot flushes and night sweats. However, the ingredients of these products may vary and their safety is unknown. They may also interfere with any other medicines you are taking.

Low mood

Low mood is a common symptom of menopause – it is different from depression.

If you're feeling low as a result of menopause you may be offered HRT. Another possible treatment is CBT (cognitive behavioural therapy) and you may be offered this if you have low mood or anxiety as a result of menopause.

Vaginal dryness

If you have vaginal dryness you should be offered vaginal oestrogen, which is put directly into the vagina as a pessary, cream or a vaginal ring. You can use vaginal oestrogen for as long as you need to, even if you are already using HRT. Moisturisers and lubricants can also help. If vaginal oestrogen doesn't help to start with you may be offered a higher dose.

It's rare for vaginal oestrogen to cause problems, but if you have any unexpected vaginal bleeding you should tell your GP. Your GP should explain that your symptoms may come back when you stop using it.

Benefits and risks of HRT

The risks of the conditions described below vary from one woman to another and depend on many risk factors. In cases where HRT is said to increase risk this usually means a very small increase in most women.

Blood clots (venous thromboembolism)

HRT tablets (but not patches or gels) are linked with a higher risk of developing a blood clot.

If you are already at higher risk of blood clots (for example, you are obese) and you are considering HRT, you may be offered patches or gel rather than tablets.

If you have a strong family history of blood clots or if there's another reason why you are at high risk of blood clots, you may be referred to a haematologist (a doctor who specialises in blood conditions) before considering HRT.

Heart disease and stroke (cardiovascular disease) Studies show that:

- If you start HRT before you're 60 it does not increase your risk of cardiovascular disease.
- HRT does not affect your risk of dying from cardiovascular disease.

HRT tablets (but not patches or gels) slightly raise the risk of stroke. However, it is important to remember that the risk of stroke in women under 60 is very low. Oestrogen-only HRT seems not to have a significant impact on stroke risk.

If you're already at higher risk of cardiovascular disease it may still be possible for you to take HRT but it will depend on your individual circumstances.

Breast cancer

Studies show that for women around menopausal age:

Oestrogen-only HRT causes little or no change in the risk of breast cancer.

HRT that contains oestrogen and progestogen **may** increase breast cancer risk. This risk may be higher if you take HRT for longer but falls again when you stop taking HRT. The risk for women NOT taking HRT is 22 in every thousand women over a period of 7.5 years, if you take combined HRT this rises to 34/1000 over 7.5 years.

Osteoporosis

When your ovaries stop making oestrogen your bones become thinner and you have a higher risk of osteoporosis, where your bones break more easily.

You should be given advice about bone health and osteoporosis at your first appointment and again when reviewing your treatment. For women around menopausal age the risk of breaking a bone is low, and HRT reduces this risk further. This benefit only lasts while you are taking HRT but it may last longer if you have taken HRT for a long time.

Loss of muscle strength

You may lose muscle strength as you reach menopause, and HRT may improve this. However, it is also important to carry on with daily activities and exercise, which will help you to stay as strong and fit as possible.

Remember the beneficial effects of healthy diet and regular exercise. Women who exercise and follow a healthy diet cope better with menopausal changes and also help protect themselves against other diseases such as heart disease and osteoporosis. A healthy diet should include 5 portions of fruit/vegetables per day. Try to include unrefined foods as much as possible, rather than refined convenience foods. Take high fat and sugar containing foods in moderation and don't take too much caffeine or alcohol. Being overweight has been shown to worsen flushes and increases the risk of heart disease and diabetes. Losing weight has been shown to reduce the risk of breast cancer .Try to maintain a healthy Body mass Index. Excess caffeine and alcohol not only worsen flushes but also increase the risk of osteoporosis.

Exercise

We should all make exercise a priority and build it into our daily routine. Regular exercise not only helps with weight loss but also reduces flushes, reduces the risk of heart disease and weight bearing exercise reduces the risk of osteoporosis. Increasing exercise has also been shown to reduce the risk of breast cancer. Many women join a gym for the first time in their 50s, which works for some but you don't have to – brisk walking is a great form of exercise and is free!

Smoking

Women who smoke have an earlier menopause than non-smokers, have worse flushes and often don't respond as well to tablet form of HRT. It's never too late to stop smoking!

Use this time in your life to start living a better healthier life.

Finally, great news, our new telephone system should be in place shortly, the new number is **01233 884585**. We have tweaked the appointment system slightly to allow, telephone consultations, routine appointments and appointments booked by the GP after a telephone call for those that need to be seen. Home visits will continue to be offered for truly housebound patients where appropriate but remember these take a great deal of time to complete. Given the constraints on our service imposed by chronic underfunding by the government, home visits are all discussed directly with the GP to see if an alternative option is more suitable such as direct admission to hospital, district nurse or social services input.

One You aims to help you get back to a healthier you, supporting you to make simple changes towards a longer and happier life. It has a series of easy questions, just click on the one that most matches what you do, and you will receive personalised recommendations based on your results and links to tools and advice to help you take action where it's most needed. 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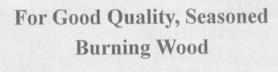
