



Following the theft of the boiler, fuel tank and fuel between Christmas and New Year our insurance claim has been met (less excess) and we hope to have normal heating back in the hall as soon as the repairs have been carried out. We will now need to spend more on security for the hall and hope that the jumble sale at the end of Jan will be successful and add to our funds for these additional and unexpected expenses.

Evacuation to Bodsham!

When my Year 3 / 4 class at Bodsham School were due to study World War Two at the end of last year, I was determined that their knowledge would be embedded by gaining an understanding of this eventful period in history through the local area. With this in mind, I delved into the musty, old school records, which are fortunately still held on site.

Reading carefully through the illuminating school log book, which details everything from contagious diseases spreading through the school to corporal punishment, I came to the following entry: '19th September 1939. School reopened after summer holidays. Miss M. I. Standing, L.A.C., head of Rathfern Road School in charge – all local children to attend for present owing to transport difficulties caused by war. 27 local children on roll, 36 London children, 3 Erith and 1 Rochester.'

The Admission Register for this period is also still held in school and provides an expansion about the children who were sent to Bodsham: they ranged in ages from four years to nine years old. The register lists the evacuees' names, dates of birth, billet address and host name as well as when and where the children went following their evacuation. Many familiar properties received the London visitors: Vigo Farm, Follytown, Coombe Grove, South View, Woodman's Arms, Kingsmill Down Cottage, Clevelands, Myrtle Cottage, Pett Farm, Bodsham Farm, Itinge Farm, etc.

After attempting to trace several of the Rathfern evacuees, I received a reply from one lady who had been among their number. After more than seventy years, she was understandably unable to recall much detail from her time, but did have this to say: 'I can remember being in a hall with the other children. There were people arriving and taking them away. I sat for a long time until there was hardly anybody in the hall by the time we left. I felt that no-one wanted us. I recall going through farm gates on the long walk to school, across what looked like the Downs grass land. It was a made up road for the last little bit, to the school. It was too far to go home at dinner time and still be back in time for the afternoon. It could have been a workers house on a farm; there was also a vegetable garden.' According to the official school records, this lady was evacuated to Kingsmill Down Cottage, in the care of Mrs Smith.

I decided that simply teaching lessons about rationing, evacuation, bombing, etc. with a mind on the local area was not quite enough and so I made contact

with Rathfern Primary School, which was still going strong in Lewisham, with a view to some kind of joint project. Rather amazingly, my headteacher backed my seemingly hair-brained idea of 'evacuating' thirty of their current children to our small school in Bodsham. This plan was put in motion and, on 11th July 2011 a coach-load of Lewisham children and their teachers arrived in the Kent countryside - seventy-two years after the first evacuees had been sent from their school. This evacuation was thankfully under more peaceful circumstances!

We started the day with Bodsham children 'picking' Rathfern evacuees and leading them into school ready for a welcome assembly from the deputy headteacher. As I'm sure the initial evacuees felt, the Lewisham children could not believe how different our rural school was; the main source of amazement stemmed from the size of the school and its beautiful country location. The idea that our children had a field to play on every break and lunchtime was met with astonishment! The Rathfern children were also intrigued to see that we had our own pond and even our own egg-laying chickens!

After initial introductions, the children were divided into groups and took part in a range of activities, including learning Morse Code, exploring a genuine American army vehicle, first aid demonstrations from St John Ambulance (including some 1940s equipment), a debate on evacuation and an art activity where each school decorated the other school's logo.

When finally the day ended, all children and staff felt that the day had been an overwhelming success and were pleased to re-ignite the historic link between our schools; it was the wish of both to continue this link beyond the occasional World War Two project and so preparations began for a reciprocal visit.

On 21st November we made the return trip with our Year 4 / 5 children (those who had been involved in the WW2 project). Despite being only an hour and half 'up the road', it was very apparent upon arrival why the Lewisham children had been so amazed by our school; their large premises (383 children on roll) was situated in the heart of a built-up, poor area of Lewisham without a blade of grass in sight! Our children were immediately welcomed from the coach and duly given a tour of their school. It was really interesting to see that despite the social deprivation of the area, the children were very well mannered with exemplary behaviour. Another very noticeable difference was the ethnic make up of Rathfern School: more than

two-thirds ethnic minority. This perceptible difference between our schools was (and will continue to be) a great benefit for teaching our children about different people which they may not regularly encounter around the Bodsham area.

After the initial tour and a quick run around for the children and a cup of coffee for the staff, we received a lovely welcome assembly from the headteacher before being split into groups for a 'getting to know you' exercise. This really helped the children get over any first nerves and shyness! Next up, our children took part in a 'London bush-tucker trial', whereby they had to taste a range of London dishes, including plantain and Jamaican chicken. One brave Bodsham boy even tried (and enjoyed!) jellied eels. This activity allowed the children to again appreciate the differences within their own country in a fun way.

Following lunch break, the schools were once again gathered together in the hall to receive a talk from a Pearly King, who enamoured the children with his glittering costume and tales of charity work. From the Pearly King talk came a large jump to the next activity: street dancing!

Our children had a wonderful opportunity to take part in a range of street dancing techniques and styles from a larger-than-life character who made the experience fun for them. It was wonderful to see some of the less academic children shine as they proudly showed off their dance moves!

Finally the day came to an end and the Bodsham children all piled back onto the coach, waving goodbye to their Lewisham friends. All the way home the children were chatting animatedly about their exciting day and all the experiences in which they had taken part.

It is the desire of both schools to maintain this historic link – plans for our next joint adventure are already afoot!

IN THE GARDEN

It may seem a dead time in the garden but now is the time to tidy up. The shedding of leaves makes the garden more accessible, you can see the bare skeleton. It is a good time to wander round the garden to see what jobs need to be done. The fine weather gives an opportunity to clean up and prepare for the spring and to rearrange those areas where in the summer planting did not work. On dry days one has the opportunity to clear away the old stems now the birds have eaten all the seeds and to clean the area between plants so their position can be clearly identified. Where plants have expanded beyond the areas you intended they should be cut back and if necessary dug out. It is a good time to rearrange borders.

Removal of all the dead plant material will reduce the hiding places for slugs, bugs etc.

Remove also those odd weeds you missed which continue to grow during the winter ready to burst into flower in the spring and to spread far and wide. Keep an eye on the emerging bulb shoots for slug damage. If necessary cover them with coarse grit or treat them with slug bait. I find the grit particularly good with Hostas,

If you have a bonfire save the ashes, they are high in potash, to put around the roses. Keep spreading the compost it is no good to the plants stuck in the compost heap.

It is time to plant onion and leek seed in small modules, plant some shallots, the onion sets can wait a month. If you haven't already planted sweet peas there is still time. When the weather is fine it is still also possible to plant out bare rooted plants. Start early potatoes by placing them in trays in a bright but frost free place so the eyes produce short shoots.

It is time to cut plants to give better control. Cut last years leaves off the Hellebores so the flowers become more prominent. It also allows any inter planted flowers like snowdrops to show up. Reduce the Wisteria shoots to two buds and cut back hard summer flowering shrubs like Spiraea to maintain a compact shape. Following its earlier pruning Buddleia should be cut back to 2-3 shoots per branch. Pruning to control apple trees like reducing the number of spurs to maintain an open structure will show benefit later in the year. All the shoots of late fruiting raspberries should be cut back to the ground (unlike the early and mid season varieties where only the fruiting shoots should have been removed earlier). Apply plenty of fertilizer and compost to all soft fruit to stimulate growth next season. SB

Dear Friends,

Ever since I've been in post (and long before!), there has been talk of how best to organise our four churches, now that we share vicars and now that the number of people prepared to be members of the Parochial Church Councils (which keep our churches going) is dwindling. The conversation usually revolves around two key questions: 'How can we best play our part in the life of our villages?' and 'How do we do this without getting so stretched that it simply stops being enjoyable, or even possible?' Many of you reading this, who are involved in other organisations, will recognise these issues: they are not just a church concern.

So that is why we want to invite **anyone who is interested** to come and meet with our four PCCs on 20^{th} February at 7.30 pm at the Evington Hall in Hastingleigh. At this meeting, we will be making a short presentation on the ways our four churches are

already working together; as well as inviting you to discuss some of the issues we are grappling with as we work to ensure that each of our parish churches has a secure and sustainable future.

Happily there is a wholehearted endorsement of our aims from all the wider groups (the Wye Benefice, the Deanery and the Diocese) of which our churches are a part. Whilst there have been several discussions exploring the possibility of changing the legal structures that underpin our churches, these conversations have only served to re-enforce the view that it really is up to local people to decide how they wish to organise themselves.

So now it is over to us to plan the way forward. And because all four churches are alive and very much here to stay, a little change is inevitable as we seek to serve the world of 2012 with the resources available to us.

All readers of this magazine, your families and friends, are warmly invited to come and play your part in shaping the shared future of our churches in your communities.




