The real Mr Selfridge

astingleigh with Elmsted W.I. met on Thursday the 7th of February 2019 at the Evington Hall. 21 members attended, and we also welcomed 1 guest.

We discussed various items of business before our speaker. Mr Ian Porter, gave us a talk on The Real Mr Selfridge and the History of Shopping. Mr Porter gave us a very interesting talk on Mr Selfridge and his contribution to modern shopping. Mr Selfridge moved from the United States to England in 1906, aged 42. He wanted to open a new style of store. Existing stores were built up from smaller business, no one had opened a brand new store from scratch before. He built the store in Oxford Street the land was cheap but the area also had potential, especially with the newly built central line. Mr Selfridge performed cutting edge market research to ensure his store would be viable. In

1909 the store opened. He employed 1800 staff, personally picked from 10,000 applicants. Selfridges was the first store to openly display goods. There was a rifle range on the roof to entertain the men whilst their ladies shopped. When Louis Bleriot became the first man to fly the Channel, his plane was displayed in Selfridges for 4 days, during which time 150,000 people visited the store to view the plane. To counteract unpleasant smells such as horse dung, Mr Selfridge placed a perfume counter at the front of the store, something that is still common practice to this day. In 1912 during the suffragette riots every store window was smashed, except Selfridges; which had a display using items in the suffragette colours. He was very good to his staff and was the first to reward rather than fine. The store was extended in 1924 to the store that exists to this very day. He coined the phrase "the customer is always right".

The Flower of the Month winner was Barbara George and the winner of the February competition, a shopping container, was Yvonne Helmer.

Our next meeting will be on Thursday the 7th March at 7.30 p.m., in the Evington Hall, where we will be having a talk entitled Travels with my Chicken. Any new members will be made most welcome.

Time to prune the roses

half on these hills, but the days are lengthening fast now. Bird song changes as though they sense the coming warmth and breeding season and energetic uplift of the cosmos — I don't just mean the flower. It's a definite time to start some sowing and, may be, catch up with those essential garden tasks that you put off when the wet winter weather was no temptation to get in the garden. (Note to self: I really must tidy the garden shed!)


Our clump of snowdrops, that herald of the spring, gave a good showing last month and the catkins were filling the hazel branches. A few days of warm weather in the middle of February brought our Christmas Box fully into flower with its creamy white flowers and heady scent that attracted, not only ourselves, but also pollen collecting honeybees, two ladybirds, some small pollinating flies and one butterfly. It's not too early to sow some hardy

annual flowers now. The Honeywort (Cerinthe major Purpurascens) can be sown under glass or indoors now ready for planting out in May for the bees who adore it. If you love it too then that's OK for it readily self seeds which ensures a continuity of supply year after year. Another hardy annual attractive to bees is Sweet Alyssum with its honey-like fragrance and long flowering season. The seeds germinate readily but need light so barely cover them with a scattering of vermiculite.

Roses should be pruned and cut back, harder than you think, so you will be rewarded with vigorous growth as the plant fights back. Cut to outward facing buds and feed and mulch with 3" of strawy manure if you have some to hand. For the hybrid teas reduce all growth to about 30 cm above ground and open up the centre of shrub roses and shorten the shoots by one third.

In the vegetable beds plant onion setts, shallots and first early potatoes such as Arran Pilot or Pentland Javelin. These could have been set up in light from early February to chit which is said to bring them on earlier to harvest, but if you haven't then don't despair, just plant in friable soil and once they are up they should be protected from frosts with a fleece or flower pots large enough to cover the foliage.

Brussels Sprouts can be sown in modules under glass or in the green-

house for they need a long growing season to reach their potential of the most flavoursome dish for the autumn and not forgetting Christmas dinner. Lettuce too can be sown under glass on an inch or so of well watered compost with the small seeds covered with only a trace of vermiculite and gently pressed down. Do not over water the lettuce or they will be in danger of suffering from 'damping off' and disappearing

almost overnight. As soon as these small plants can be handled they can be potted on into a general purpose compost in individual small pots to keep then growing well until the weather warms some more and they can then be hardened off over time ready to be planted outside. Sprouts especially benefit from planting deep so that the first leaves are level with the compost to make sturdy plants.

Russian biologist wrote that the air in a pine forest is almost germfree due to the 'phytoncides' released from their needles. This substance is also found in spices, onion, garlic and oak trees.

Walnut trees also have a substance in their leaves which is

dangerous to insects. Long ago, garden designers were advised to plant a walnut tree with a seat underneath which would provide both a comfortable place to sit and for folks to be able to relax almost mosquito free.

Gardens and grounds of Canterbury cathedral, past and
present, tracking the history and
development of the cathedral
grounds since the land was first
given to the church by King
Ethelbert.

In December, the gardeners held their Christmas party with a musical performance by Trevor Wye and the Studio Players followed by cheese and wine.

At the January meeting,
Lorraine introduced Melanie
Gibson-Barton, who gave a talk
entitled "From Passchendaele to
Peace? – did the war end in
1918 or did it only pause." This
was the 3rd time that Ms
Gibson-Barton has spoken to
Evington Gardeners about
topics inspired by her long
connection with Belgium,
especially Bruges, and her
fascination by the first World

War. Through her meticulous research, fascinating facts and statistics were presented through a series of photographs, maps and charts, but in no way like a history lesson. The photos, old and new, depicted scenes from the war interspersed with photos of the many memorials erected to commemorate brave deeds by individuals, events and emotional representations, such as the statue of a soldier comforting a wounded horse. The next set of photos carried the viewer through the years following WWI, showing scenes of devastation, the rebuilding of France and Belgium, including the gathering of munitions and the use of artefacts by the local people, and events during the years leading up to WW2, and Hitler's pilgrimage to the battlefields in 1940. The final set of photos showed the incredible strength of spirit of the people who were involved in the horrors of these years. It was a truly inspirational and thoughtprovoking presentation.

allow Deer stand like silken beige silhouettes against the greening winter wheat and woods, one always standing at attention - often the stag. Whilst listening to trees a Buzzard emerges, silently but clumsily; not to circle and soar on the thermals as in Spring and Summer making its plaintive cry - so seemingly fit for a much smaller bird – now more content to lurk on the fringe of a wood seeking out voles and rabbits or road casualties. Bushy-tailed, skipping, fearless Squirrels are the young ones; still hiding food that they may well forget.

In January under a waning moon vixens and dog foxes are calling menacingly at midnight. The vixens are in season now and beginning to seek out a territory. The cubs will arrive with their cloudy blue eyes in March and April. The dog fox will bring food to the nearby earth. There are

separate covies of ten English Partridge and nine French Partridge in Bodsham. The English are survivors in a world where they are punished by lack of good habitat, lack of insects and a surfeit of crows and magpies. Each covey represents a family from the Summer. They roost in a circle in the middle of a large field all looking outwards, on guard. In January and February the parents will tell their young to move on, to find new fields and hedges. The English Partridge is one of the most endangered birds in Great Britain. We have a duty to preserve them. Huge flocks of Linnets lift away from the foragerich stubble on the one hundred acre Gordon field in Bodsham.



From The History Enthusiast

Mary Honywood

ast month's article 'So they do say' referred to a picture in Elmsted church inscribed with details about Mary Honywood of Charing and the 367 children that had descended from her. It asked the question where is that Honywood picture now. The mystery is solved. Sir Filmer Honywood 11th bt. is the keeper of the Honywood records and has commented: "I, too, would like to know its present whereabouts, as I sent it with others to a picture restorer in London in 1969, who did not return it with the others and claimed that it went missing after a party in a house or flat close to his studio. It is rather a long and complex story and, although I have a copy of the police note of the report to them at their London West Central station, they subsequently closed

it and lost or destroyed their records. The portrait did eventually surface around '94 in Whitstable, but, despite photographic and other detailed information, a Kent Police Inspector said that they did not consider there was sufficient evidence that a crime had been committed; and, in the meantime, it was smuggled out of the country!

I registered the portrait with The Art Loss Register, and am sending a colour photo of it separately.

There are several similar, but not necessarily identical, portraits, of Mary, including one in Lincoln Cathedral Library and another owned by the Earl of Radnor, as well as a bad copy in my own possession. The stolen one was painted around 1600 by Marcus Gheeraedts the younger."

Indeed They Do Say!

Pollowing on from last month's 'So the do say!..' the following might be of interest. Remarkable really that there appears to have been such fecundity locally in the 17th century; also a connection with the Honywoods. The photo is of a marble memorial in Smeeth church dated 1654 to the two Mrs Scotts.

The inscriptions to the ladies is as follows:-

Priscilla Scott Daughtr to Thomas Honywood of Elmisted Knight wife To Robert Scott of Mersham Esq by Whom shee had Nine Children Whereof foure now living: Shee Died in ye 52 Yeare of her age Ano Dni 1648

Farming Notebook

ebruary is probably the bleakest month of the year. Often wet and windy, sometimes snowy, but usually with not much going on in the fields.

We choose February to get through our annual inspections for the Assured Combinable Crops Scheme (ACCS), Farm Assured British Beef and Lamb (FABBL), and this year, for the first time for a long time Assured Produce (AP). The latter is for the sale of our ware or eating potatoes into the supermarket outlets.

It is a time when literally weeks are spent collating information in preparation for the inspection. So much seems obvious, but we have to write it down and have a record. Grain storage is a major part of ACCS. Records have to show that moisture content and temperature of the grains have been monitored and controlled. Moisture content is important because the market demands less than 15%, but temperature is also critical. Temperatures below 10 degrees C practically stop any insect activity in the stored crop. There are "pit fall" traps buried in the grain to check

for insects and the inspection of these has to be logged. Cleaning records for all the machinery have to be kept and presented. It is quite clear that we look after our equipment, it is clean and well maintained, but we must write down each time the pressure washer is used and each time the engine oil is changed.

Fortunately most of the cropping records can be retrieved from our agronomy programme. All our work plans are generated by this programme and once the plan is complete it becomes a work record. All soil testing, operator details, crop analysis and field histories are kept and can be retrieved by the touch of a button. this saves a great deal of time and paper.

We have a similar programme which will manage the grain and potato stores. We have not used it for the last couple of years because the stores are full for a relatively short time and it seemed an unnecessary expense. Now that we are having to comply with Assured Produce we will bring this programme into play for the coming season.

We must have certificates of lawful disposal of farm plastics including triple rinsed chemical containers. There must be a licence granted by the Environment Agency for a designated area where we can wash off the sprayer and have a bonfire-only for the burning of material generated

on the farm such as hedge cuttings. The burning of a broken pallet is a real no no!

FABBL requires all the livestock movements throughout the year including birth and deaths are recorded and written down. Cleaning records of the livestock trailer with the correct disinfectant have to be shown. Calculations for barn area and trough space provided for each animal have to be worked out and written down. Drug records including drug batch numbers and vet dockets have to be kept and shown.

Staff training records which include certificates showing competence for spraying, fertiliser application, quad bike usage, slug pellet application, chain saw use, rodent control, first aid, and forklift operation have to be current. For most, annual refresher courses are needed and the resulting certificate produced for the inspector.

Assured Produce requires a whole new level of compliance. Control of Substances Hazardous to Health (COSSH) and Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points (HACCPS) have to be undertaken for every step of the potato production process. From "what would you do if a hydraulic pipe burst on the potato planter?". ("Mend it" is not an acceptable answer!) Right through to ensuring

that any staff involved with grading the potatoes do not have mobile phones, watches or jewellery which could be lost and appear in a bag of potatoes on the supermarket shelf. The latter, despite the fact that any potatoes destined for human consumption are sent off the farm in bulk and will be graded again...

Everything that is required of us to get our "red tractor" accreditation for cereals, livestock and produce is justifiable. Most of it obvious. That is the problem! We just have to get into the mindset to write down and record everything, even the obvious. So much for my aspiration of a paperless office!

Another issue that has been occupying February days is the steady stream of agrochemicals which are having their licences withdrawn. As a result many chemical active ingredients which allow the levels of crop productivity of recent decades are no longer available to us. The frustration is that often decisions are made politically and not scientifically. Alternatives which are far less effective will have to be used. The irony will be that we will have to spray more not less with every chemical withdrawn. In the past there was always a new product about to come on stream to replace lost or ineffective chemicals.

This is no longer so. Business does not want to invest the multi millions required to develop a new product and risk it failing due to a political whim.

On the herbicide front we are about to lose Diquat, a vital tool in growing seed potatoes. This will provide us with a real challenge, and I am convinced that as a result some potato varieties will disappear. Roundup (Glyphosate) is again under threat. There is no alternative except to wind the clock back forty years and control grass weeds with multiple cultivations. Using more metal and more fuel despite Mr Gove saying he wants us all to direct drill and throw away the plough! Joined up thinking? I think not!

My concern is that the government will be desperate to avoid food inflation post Brexit and will allow food in that has the benefit of using all the chemistry which we domestically have chosen to ban. To me, it seems logical that if we choose a standard of production for domestic food production the same rules should apply to imports. This will not happen. It does not happen. GM, chlorine treated chicken, hormone treated beef will flood in because they are cheap and allow us to trade manufactured goods with the US and others. I live in hope that we will value our food, for its quality, its safety and provenance rather than cost.

Soon it will be March. Spring will be on its way. Crops will start to grow and optimism will return... W Wilson-Haffenden
